

CONCURRENT GRADUATE CERTIFICATE IN INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT POLICY (IDP)

The Master of International Development Policy (MIDP) Program offers a Certificate in International Development Policy (IDP) to students enrolled in other full time graduate programs. This certificate is earned concurrently to one's Master's degree in another program. To earn the certificate, the following courses must be fulfilled prior to, or in conjunction with your graduation from your degree program:

1. Development Management Seminar (3 credits)
2. Development Economics Seminar (3 credits)
3. International Development Elective (6 credits)

Total required for completion of certificate: 12 credits (a minimum of 6 credits must be Duke University courses)

APPLICATION PROCESS:

Overall enrollment in the certificate program is limited to 30 students. All students interested in the IDP certificate must complete the [Online Certificate Application](#) at least 6 months *prior* to their graduation term. See the following deadlines below:

May Graduates: Application Due December 1st
 September Graduates: Application Due March 1st
 December Graduates: Application Due July 1st

Students may begin taking courses toward completion of the certificate before they are officially enrolled in the certificate program. Students will be enrolled on a space-available basis, as the program is limited to 30 at a given time. ***Once the certificate has been added to the academic record it cannot be removed.*** Should the student fail to complete the requirements by the end of their graduation term, the certificate will appear as "discontinued" on their academic record. Once added to your record, you will have priority access during the first 48 hours of registration to MIDP classes, which is held exclusively for MIDP fellows.

Below is a list of courses offered by the Duke Center for International Development (DCID) and the Sanford School of Public Policy which are approved to count towards the certificate. Space is not guaranteed in any particular course. Courses vary from year to year depending on faculty availability. Any classes with course numbers 590, 789, or 790 are usually applicable to the certificate, but are not listed below as their topics and titles change from year to year. Please check DukeHub for the most current, available courses. Neighboring universities may be accessed through their own registrar sites. If you are interested in counting a class towards the certificate that is not listed, please email Stephanie Lowd at Stephanie.Lowd@duke.edu with the course name and a current or previous syllabus to be submitted for approval.
